

Lights and decorations, costumes and masks, a constant parade of strangers at the door... Halloween can be a downright spooky experience for our pets with risks of poisoning, intestinal blockage, and lost pets.

CONCERNS

- **Poisoning:** Ingestion of raisins or Halloween candy containing chocolate or xylitol, both of which can be toxic for pets
- Intestinal blockage: Glow sticks, some candies, decorations, or parts of a pet's costume could cause intestinal blockage
- Injury: Lit candles or jack-o-lanterns can burn
- Stress and escape: Noises, strangers in costumes, continuous door ringing, and opening and closing of the door can stress your pets and give them opportunity to escape

PREVENTION

- Don't feed Halloween candy to your pets
- Never leave your pet unsupervised with accessible candy or decorations, or while they are in costume
- Identify your pet with a registered microchip, collar, and ID tag
- Keep lit candles, jack-o-lanterns, glow sticks, and other decorations out of reach
- Give your pet a quiet, safe hiding place inside and away from activity

MAKE SURE PET COSTUMES

- · Fit properly
- Have no pieces that can easily be chewed off or cause choking
- · Don't hinder sight, hearing, breathing, opening the mouth, or movement
